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STEWARDSHIP CORNER

WHERE HAS THE TIME GONE?

The calendar now reads April 2025, which means that both 2024 and the entire First Quarter of 2025 are in the rear view mirror. Time goes by so quickly. The clock never stops. The calendar page turning never seems to slow down. But occasionally **we** need to slow down, stop, and reflect. Humans were not created for 365/24/7 operation.

So what should we stop and reflect on? In the matter of stewardship, a good start are the two questions presented in recent Stewardship Corner articles: (1) How has God blessed us? (2) How is God calling us to respond? This month's article is a quick reflection on those.

As we think about those two questions, we can consider several general truths that have been previously highlighted about how God has blessed us:

- (a) God created all things.
- (b) We don't truly own anything.
- (c) God gave and continues to give us opportunities, abilities, and gifts to steward in His creation.

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A 6th Century hymn speaks about Christ's death on Good Friday, which we commemorate this month: "*The royal banners forward go;* / *The cross shows forth redemption's flow,* / *Where He, by whom our flesh was made,* / *Our ransom in His flesh has paid.*" [*Lutheran Service Book* 455:1] Its lyrics emphasize that this act keeps great promises that the LORD made about deliverance: "*Fulfilled is all that David told* / *In sure prophetic song of old,* / *That God the nations' king should be* / *And reign in triumph from the tree.*" [*LSB* 455:3]

This saving act involves Jesus' humiliating death, which is actually a work of divine power. That's the profound mystery of Christ's sacrifice. When we consider what transpired on Good Friday, everything looks like weakness and defeat. The religious leaders of Judea rid themselves of Jesus, whom they judged to be a false teacher. The Roman prefect denies justice to Jesus, washing his hands of the matter and turning Him over to the demands of the crowd. The followers of Jesus are present only at a distance, if at all.

Nothing seems successful during the waning moments of Good Friday. But looks can be deceiving. In the midst of His humiliation, Jesus accomplishes a great result. Jesus' crucifixion isn't the punishing of a hardened felon or the crushing of a failed revolutionary. Instead, it's an act of ransom being made, His death being the payment price that hangs from the cross: "On whose hard arms, so widely flung, | The weight of this world's ransom hung, | The price of humankind to pay | And spoil the spoiler of his prey." [LSB 455:4]

The result is revealed in what happens afterward: "This Jesus, delivered up according to the definite plan and foreknowledge of God, you crucified and killed by the hands of lawless men. God raised him up, loosing the pangs of death, because it was not possible for him to be held by it."(Ac 2:23-24) Jesus is raised from death—not only for His benefit but for ours: "God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us. Since, therefore, we have now been justified by his blood, much more shall we be saved by him from the wrath of God. For if while we were enemies we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son, much more, now that we are reconciled, shall we be saved by his life. More than that, we also rejoice in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation."(Ro 5:8-11)

That rejoicing is expressed in the Church's hymns, including one written by the same author who penned those lyrics about the royal banners of Good Friday: "Hail thee, festival day! | Blest day to be hallowed forever; | Day when our Lord was raised, | Breaking the kingdom of death.... Rise from the grave now, O Lord, | The author of life and creation. | Treading the pathway of death, | New life You give to us all." [LSB 489:Refrain, 2E] The Holy Week events don't end with death, but with life. Jesus' spirit is received by His Father on Good Friday. Even more so, fullness of life is revealed in Jesus' resurrection on Easter Sunday.

That makes the Holy Week events which we celebrate so essential to our faith. We know what was accomplished, not measuring by what we see, but by what the Crucified and Risen Jesus declares about them: "Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory? ... Thus it is written, that the Christ should suffer and on the third day rise from the dead, and that repentance for the forgiveness of sins should be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem."(Lk 24:26, 46-47)

We confess our belief in what Jesus' death and resurrection accomplishes for us: "that I may be His own and live under Him in His kingdom and serve Him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness, just as He is risen from the dead, lives and reigns to all eternity." [Small Catechism: Creed, Art. 2] So we can rightly say: "Alleluia! Christ is risen! The Lord is risen indeed! Alleluia!"

We can also note principles about how God has called us to respond:

- (a) The gifts that God bestows to us come with responsibilities and accountabilities.
- (b) God wants us to shine our light of stewardship, shining as He enables us to do (*Mt 5:14-16*).
- (c) We are instructed to put our hand to the plow and look ahead as we walk the life of discipleship (*Lk* 9:62).

Time does keep going. God keeps calling and presenting opportunities, but the response size or quantity aren't what truly matter. We all are blessed and respond to Him as we are able. He has entrusted us with His creation.

So as the Second Quarter of 2025 begins, stop and reflect on those questions: (1) How has God blessed me? (2) How is God calling me to respond? Then take the opportunity to put those answers into action in your life of discipleship.

Calvary has adopted Chaplain Aaron Bell and his family. The Bells attended Calvary for several months while awaiting orders for his next duty station.



MEN'S WORK – MEN'S IMPACT GROUP

At the Men's Breakfast on March 22, attendees acknowledged the presence of our Lord with Luther's Morning Prayer followed by the *Portals of Prayer* devotion for the day: "Held Up". The message was from Ezekiel 33 giving encouragement about living with the knowledge that God takes "no pleasure in the death of the wicked, but that the wicked turn from his way and live."^(Ezk 33:11) In this season of Lent and every day, God calls us to repent and return to Him.

The goal of the session was for men to learn more about each other and where they fit into the mission of Calvary. In short, how are they connected and can apply the five essentials provided by the Holy Spirit through the Apostles mentioned in Acts 2, especially: "And all who believed were together and had all things in common." (Acc 2:44)

All those present shared a special word about themselves and how they are connected at Calvary, how they take care of their health, and an idea about going forward as a men's group. Pastor Zimmerman encouraged us to focus on the four different aspects of congregational life as noted in our mission statement:

- Worshiping and studying the Word of God.
- Nurturing and providing support and encouragement to each other.
- Witnessing to the saving power of the Gospel to our community, country, and world.
- Serving as good stewards of God's gifts by using our time, talents, and treasures to further His kingdom.
